ATTENDANCE WARNING:

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES: This course focuses on the mechanics of trying a jury trial from start to finish, including courtroom presentation, *voir dire* (jury selection), opening statements, direct and cross examination, closing arguments, jury instructions, basic trial evidence, trial strategy and tactics. By the end of the semester, students will have a thorough understanding of the trial process, and will develop the basic skills of a trial lawyer.
