Course Objectives: The goals of Basic Bar Studies (“BBS”) are to introduce students to the skills necessary to succeed on the Essay, Multi-State Bar Exam (“MBE”), and Performance Test sections of the California Bar Examination. These skills, however, are applicable across jurisdictions. By the end of the course, successful students will have: (1) created essay templates for a variety of topics and sub-topics for the bar exam; (2) developed the ability to use issues checklists to write well-organized and thorough essay answers within the one hour allotted by the California Bar Examiners for each essay; (3) developed the ability to identify legal issues on essay and MBE questions; (4) developed the ability to identify and analyze legally significant facts; (5) developed a strategy for organizing an answer to a performance exam; (6) practiced writing answers to essay and performance exams; (7) practiced doing and reviewing MBE questions; and (8) developed the ability to self-assess their performance on essay, multi-state and performance exam practice questions.

Course Methodology: This course has been designed as a significant departure from traditional law school instruction and course work because it teaches a set of study skills that are unique to the Bar Exam—and because it begins your preparation for that exam. Using materials from Western State, U-World, Themis Bar Review and Mary Basick/Tina Schindler’s Essay Book, you will follow a rigorous weekly program and become proficient in employing the following skills:

- (1) viewing substantive lecture, filling in workbooks and doing assessment questions;
- (2) creating essay templates;
- (3) Completing writing assignments and self-assessments;
- (4) using a method to identify key facts/issues and outline an essay answer;
- (5) writing and assessing essay exams through graded assignments taking and assessing MBE questions;
- (6) developing a strategy for organizing the file and library of a 90-minute performance exam; and
- (7) writing and assessing performance exams through graded assignments, in-class work and out-of-class work.
- (8) developing skills and strategy for taking MBE Questions

During the fourteen-week semester, this course will cover the three components of the California Bar Exam: The Essay Portion; the Performance Test, and the MBE. If you are taking the Uniform Bar Exam, these three components are also present, though are tested slightly differently than the California Bar Exam (please talk to Professor Shah or Professor Kim-Jackson so they can get you additional material).

Course Subjects: You will cover the following in the respective courses:

Following the conclusion of the course, and leading up to the bar exam, you will then follow the same approach for each of the remaining subjects, as well as engage in additional practice and review of each testable subject, the Performance Test, and the MBE, as you study with the Custom Course Schedule from Themis (or your selected bar company) as well as the Western State Live Program.

Course Materials:

1. **Themis:** The required BBS course materials will be provided by Themis, a commercial bar preparation company, as well as a BBS workbook from your professor.
 - a. Fall 2023 start and after: Post-Graduate Themis Court is complementary.
 - b. Pre-Fall 2023 start: If you started law school prior to Fall 2023, the fee for the Themis program is \$1,595.00 because the Themis fees were not incorporated into your tuition. *A credit will be issues to you for the amount you have already paid for your U-World Subscription.*
 - c. The program includes all materials for BBS and for the post-graduation bar preparation program (the remainder of the Themis materials will be shipped out to you in November). For the BBS course, the materials will consist of: **Modules (online), Outlines (also in hard copy form), Lecture Handouts (online), Assessment Qs (online).**
2. **U-World:** Your MBE questions for the BBS MBE Course will be assigned on your U-World Platform. *It is highly recommended that you practice additional questions in addition to what is assigned to you.*
3. **Essay Exam Writing for the California Bar Exam** by Mary Basick and Tina Schindler. This is the coursebook you will be using in your Essay Course, but the outlines, checklists and attack sheets are also very useful for the MBE course. ***Please purchase the newest editions as the law and essays have changed from prior versions.
4. **WSCL CALIFORNIA BAR EXAM WORKBOOK (online).** Sections from the Internal WSCL Bar Exam Workbook, which offers condensed portions of the law, will be assigned to you for review.
5. **In-Class/LEXIS Classroom Handouts:** We will be providing Handouts for you to bring to class (or which will be provided in class) such as PowerPoint printouts, Essay printouts, and Question Set Handouts.
6. **BarEssays.Com.** Western State College of Law has arranged for FREE access to BarEssays.com to graduates taking the February 2027 California Bar Exam. BarEssays.com is a popular supplementary study tool for your bar review course, featuring a database of over 3,000 authentic graded and returned essays from prior California Bar Exams.

For more information and to obtain your FREE standard membership (a \$175 value), go to BarEssays.com, create a new account, and enter coupon code **"WSU2026"** on the payment screen. After entering the code, you will gain immediate access. No credit card or payment information is required. Note: You must register for an account with your wsulaw.edu email address for the code to activate.

Class Participation: Legal education is a cooperative venture. Class participation therefore is a mandatory part of this course. Any student who is deemed unprepared for class will be treated as absent for that day and a student who is unprepared on two (2) occasions will automatically be withdrawn from the course.

Requirements for In-Person Class:

- Arrive to class early.
- Come to class prepared.
- Do not multitask on your computer – stay focused on the class discussion.
- If you have to miss a class, arrive late, or leave early, notify the professor in advance.

- Be ready to participate in class.
- ***Please remember that you have two absences allotted for the Essay class and two absences allotted for the MBE class, but since the class is extremely fast paced, missing a class may cause you to miss an entire subject (e.g., Torts, etc.).***

Course Grading¹: The **Essay/PT Class** and **MBE Class** are graded separately; therefore, you will receive two separate grades for BBS.

Your grade for the **Essay/PT Class** (3 units) is based on the following four components:

- (1) Your score on the written portion of the midterm (30%);
- (2) Your score on the written portion of the final examination (50%);
- (3) Essay Templates, Practice Writing Assignments and Participation during the semester (10%);
and
- (4) Six (6) graded mandatory writing assignments (essays/PT) submitted during the semester (10%).

*Note: For (3) and (4) above, your final grade does not hinge on the accuracy of your templates or how high you scored on the writing assignments, but rather on your timely submission of the work, your improvement, and your **good-faith effort** throughout the course.*

Your grade for the **MBE Class** (3 units) is based on the following four components:

- (1) Your score on the MBE portion of the midterm (30%);
- (2) Your score on the MBE portion of the final examination (50%);
- (3) Completion of viewing your Themis lectures online, completing the Themis lecture fill-in-the blank handouts/PDF, Assessment Questions, Weekly MBE Homework and Tracking Sheets (10%) (*We track your online Themis video completion, assessment questions and U-World Work*)
- (4) Diagnostics Exam and 3 Graded Quizzes (5 questions each) (10%)
 - a. Each Quiz is worth 3%, with an automatic 1% added for completing the diagnostic exam and all the quizzes
 - b. Quiz breakdown:
 - i. 3, 4 or 5 out of 5 questions right = 3%
 - ii. 1 or 2 questions right = 2%
 - iii. 0 questions right (with a good faith effort) and just taking the quiz = 1%

*Note: For (3) your final grade does not hinge on accuracy of your answers to the weekly assignments, but rather on your timely submission of the work, your improvement, and your **good-faith effort** throughout the course. For (3) above your Diagnostic requires a good faith effort, however your quiz grades are based on the number of questions you get right.*

Good Faith Effort: Students will not receive any credit for assignments in which they do not put in good faith effort. The following are an example which would give you no credit on your assignment:

- (1) Incomplete assignments (essay templates, miniessay and/or assigned essays);
- (2) Incomplete MBE tracking sheets
- (3) Abnormally low scores on MBE questions (less than 20%) which may demonstrate one may have only been clicking through the questions randomly, which is usually evidenced by the tracking sheet.

Collective Community Course Grading Rule: If **less than 90 %** of the class completes assignments in good faith at *any time* during the semester the following **RULE** goes into effect:

¹ While your final course grade will be determined by your assigned BBS professor, any professor in the ASP Department may grade your assignments.

- (1) If any individual student fails to complete in good faith two or more assignments after the effective date of the RULE or is unprepared two or more times in Category 3 of MBE Assignments listed in "Course Grading" Section in the Syllabus, then that student will receive 0/10% for that category.
- (2) If any student fails to complete two or quizzes in category (4) of MBE Assignments listed in "Course Grading" Section in the Syllabus after the effective date of the RULE, then that student will receive 0/10% for that category.
- (3) If any student fails to complete in good faith two or more assignments or is unprepared two or more times in Category (3) of Essay Assignments listed in "Course Grading" Section of the Syllabus after the effective date of the RULE, then that student will receive 0/10% for that category.
- (4) If any student fails to complete in good faith two or more assignments in Category (4) of Essay Assignments listed in "Course Grading" Section on the Syllabus after the effective date of the RULE, then that student will receive 0/10% for that category.

After-Class Assignments: After every class session you will be completing homework assignments. Those assignments will include: drafting Mini Essays, essay templates, issues checklists, practice essays, and self-assessments; taking MBE quizzes; completing tracking sheets, worksheets, lecture handouts, and other assignments directed at helping you learn the material and practice the skills on which you will be tested on your midterm, final examination, and the California Bar Examination. You will be graded on the extent to which your submissions demonstrate a good faith effort to successfully complete the assignments.

Homework Expectations and Time Commitment: Because this class begins your preparation for the bar exam, it requires a substantial amount of work outside of class time. The ABA standards state that students should spend, on average, *at least* two hours of preparation for every one hour of class time. BBS requires approximately 14-18 hours/week of outside work. Overall, with in-class time, please expect to spend 20-24 hours per week on BBS.

Class Attendance: If you arrive late to class, leave during class time, or depart early (without prior permission), you will be marked absent for that session. If you miss more than two class sessions, you will be withdrawn from the class.

Thus, unless explicitly authorized by your BBS professor, the use of generative AI in any component of this course is prohibited. You may not upload any assignment materials, handouts, or any other document that you receive as part of this course to any AI/Note taking platform. We encourage you to recognize the value of generative AI to aid legal professionals, but only once the fundamental skills have been mastered. This policy aims to ensure that students gain a solid understanding and ability in legal writing and research first, thereby enabling them to use generative AI appropriately and effectively in the future. All writing must be your own original work product and represent your individual intellectual effort. Any use of generative AI for any assignment in BBS is considered an Honor Code Violation.

Western State College of Law – Programmatic Learning Outcomes

Western State College of Law’s curriculum is designed so that every student achieves a level of competency prior to graduation in each of the eight Programmatic Learning Outcomes listed below:

(1) Doctrinal Knowledge

Students will demonstrate knowledge of substantive and procedural law in the core curriculum subjects, including Contracts, Criminal Law, Criminal Procedure, Torts, Real Property, Business Association, Evidence, Civil Procedures, Constitutional Law, Estates, Community Property, Remedies, and Professional Responsibility.

(2) Practice Skills

Students will demonstrate the development of other law practice skills. Each student’s chosen outcomes within this category will be varied based on the student’s particular interests, coursework and work experiences. They may include, but are not limited to, the following topics: oral presentation and advocacy; interviewing; counseling; client service and business development; negotiations, mediation, arbitration, or other alternate dispute resolution methods; advanced legal research and writing (excluding purely academic papers and the first four units earned in introductory first-year legal research and writing class); applied legal writing such as drafting contracts, pleadings, other legal instruments; law practice management or the use of technology in law practice; cultural competency; collaboration or project management; financial analysis, such as accounting, budgeting project management, and valuation; cost benefit analysis in administrative agencies; use of technology, data analyses, or predictive coding; business strategy and behavior; pre-trial preparation, fact investigation, such as discovery, e-discovery, motion practice, assessing evidence, or utilizing experts; trial practice; professional civility and applied ethics; a law clinic that includes a classroom component; or a legal externship that includes a classroom component.

(3) Legal Analysis

Students will demonstrate the ability to identify the factual and legal issues implicated by a fact pattern and to appropriately use cases (including identifying the salient features of an appropriate precedent case, identifying legally significant similarities or differences between the precedent case and a fact pattern and explaining why those are legally significant) and rules (including the ability to connect legally significant facts in a fact pattern to the rule) to predict how a court would decide the issue. Students will also demonstrate the ability to identify and evaluate the public policies of a precedent case or rule and be able to evaluate how public policy can impact the application of a rule to the legal issue.

(4) Legal Research

Students will demonstrate the ability to locate relevant legal authority using a variety of book and electronic resources, and to properly cite to such legal authority.

(5) Communication

Students will demonstrate the ability to communicate both orally and in writing in a manner appropriate to a particular task to effectively convey the author or speaker's ideas. This includes audience sensitivity in written and oral communication (the ability to adopt a tone, style and level of detail appropriate to the needs, knowledge and expertise of the audience); and written communication basic proficiency (the ability to use the conventions of grammar, spelling, punctuation, diction and usage appropriate to the task and sufficient to convey effectively the author's ideas).

(6) Advocacy of Legal Argument

Students will demonstrate the ability, in both oral and written formats, to evaluate the legal, economic and social strengths and weaknesses of a case and use case and statutory authority as well as public policy to persuade others. Making policy-based arguments includes the ability to identify and evaluate the public policies of a precedent case or rule and their implications and be able to assert such appropriate arguments to support a particular application or distinction of a precedent case to a legal controversy or a particular resolution of the application of a rule to the legal controversy.

(7) Client Sensitivity and Cultural Competency

Students will demonstrate an awareness of clients' needs and goals, including a sensitivity to clients' background and circumstances (including, but not limited to, socio-economic, gender, race, ethnicity, educational, disability and/or religious background(s)), the ability to make decisions that reflect an appropriate focus on those needs and goals, and awareness that cultural issues may affect the relevance of facts and application of the law.

(8) Legal Ethics

Students will demonstrate the ability to identify ethical issues in law practice contexts and make appropriate decisions to resolve such issues.
